

## **Editorial**

The third quarter of this year has distinguished itself by several particularly significant events. The most outstanding events have included the ratification of IDA credit loan as well as the Islamic Development Bank loan by the **Parliament.** This ratification has been followed by the issuance by H.E. the President of the Republic of two laws stating full agreement to the loans. In another significant occasion, the President of the **Republic received the SFD** Managing Director who gave H.E. the President a briefing on SFD activities during the previous period.

The Managing Director also gave a presentation before the Cabinet on the SFD policies and operations during the last three years.

At the internal level the third quarter of the year 2000 is being dominated by the continuous endeavors to implement the SFD Annual Plan as well as several policy issues and measures. This includes extensive discussions concerning the SFD capacity building with the objective of reviewing the organization's structure in line with the SFD ambitions to widen and diversify its activities during the second phase.

On September 20, H.E. President Ali Abdulla Saleh received Mr. Abdulkarim I. Al-Arhabi the SFD Managing Director. The Managing Director briefed the President on the SFD ongoing activities and its achievements during the past three years. The President expressed his satisfaction and stressed the importance in targeting the needy areas.

## Ratification of the loan agreements with **IDA and the Islamic Development Bank**

On September 17<sup>th</sup>, 2000, H.E. Ali Abdulla Saleh, President of the Republic issued the following two laws. Law No. (23) for the year 2000

ratifying the loan agreement signed on 9/6/2000 with the International **Development Association to finance the** Social Fund for Development Project (Second Phase) with the sum of Fifty Six Million Special Drawing Rights, equivalent to Seventy Five Million US Dollars. Law No. (24) for the year 2000 ratifying the loan agreement signed on 14/5/2000 with the Islamic Development Bank to finance the Social Fund for Development Project (Second Phase) with the sum of Four Million and Four Hundred Thousand Islamic Dinars, equivalent to Six Million US Dollars. The Parliament had ratified the two credit agreements during its meeting on August 19, 2000.

## Infrastructure Unit News

#### Workshop in Feeder Road Schemes

## **Training Unit News**

The training concentrated on the following:

- Training of Trainers in agricultural fields.
- Training of agricultural extension agents.

Training of technical staff and extension agents working in forestry and horticulture.

Training of technical and veterinary staff working in the field of animal wealth.

Providing support for ten associations and NGOs to enable them to improve and develop the training facilities

which they provide to female beneficiaries in local communities in the following governorates and districts: Sana'a City, Hodeida City, Zabid, Rada'a, Ta'iz City and Aden.

Providing technical and training support for the Social Welfare Fund (third phase) aiming at the development of the database that was created and developed by the SFD during the first and second phase. The third phase will achieve the data analysis and the publicity of the social indicators, as well as accomplishing the central information records database (The system of gathering and exchange of information

Training for Training Unit Staff:

Within the framework of the SFD efforts to develop the capacity of SFD staff through internal and external training, Ms. A. Al-Sharki, head of Training Unit and Mr. Suleiman Ghanem, Training Projects' officer attended a course in Casablanca , Morocco last August . The training concentrated on the development of training and programming skills at the supervisory level as well as the evaluation and monitoring of training programs and their components.

## The Training Course for Credit Officers :


A training course for credit officers took place from the 10<sup>th</sup> to the 16<sup>th</sup> of Sep 2000, in which eighteen credit officers participated. The course included an introduction in Micro-Finance, effective communication skills, and selection of clients, feasibility study, sustainability, indicators, and gender issues. The goal of the course was to give credit officers working with SFD Micro-Credit programs some background knowledge to help carry out their duties. One of the objectives of the course was also to test the curriculum, developed by Mr. Abu El-Yazeed, intended to be used in the future to conduct more of such training sessions.

## □ The Training Center for Traditional Hand-Made Carpets :

After the training of 40 trainees was accomplished during the first stage of this project, Al-Islah Charitable Society (the implementing agency) took the step of continuing its involvement by establishing and running a production center for the graduates. Currently, the graduates manufacture handmade carpets using equipment and raw materials provided by the NGO, which then provides for the marketing.
